# Work, for people with disabilities: a human need

Dear friends of L'Arche Montreal,

Moreover, work does not only help to distance us from these evils but in fact valorises each one of us and contributes toward the development of skills on different levels.

At IArche Montreal, we are witness to the beautiful artistic creations made by the people at IAlizé workshop on a daily basis. The uniqueness of this art that pours forth out of the creativity of people with intellectual handicaps and the assistants who work with them is striking. The proof is that on each occasion where the works of our artists are shown or exhibited they are honored at their just value. I would like to take this opportunity to compliment these accomplished artists for their extraordinary talents.

It is true that lately, many people who have intellectual handicaps are losing their work because of certain changes that are taking place with the reorganization of social services. It is as though once again people with intellectual handicaps, who are already underfunded when it comes to social services, must take second place. This reality is difficult to understand, because these people have the same rights and needs as all of us. They benefit from the values procured with work as much as us. These people build up society just as much as we do. I dare to believe that this reality will quickly be taken into consideration so that the work for intellectually handicapped people may be valued. A society that gives such little regard for its weakest members, which does not value a certain category of people may lose its soul. Inasmuch as we share a common humanity, there is no place for discrimination.

To finish, I will not neglect to mention that we are all journeying toward Easter.

Our community is living this season with the focus on forgiveness and reconciliation, the theme suggested to us by L'Arche international. Forgiveness and reconciliation are two cardinal values in building up human society.

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

Danick gradually began his integration, and since November he has lived permanently at la Passerelle. For us, to see Danick feel so much at home and liking the people he lives

with, and to see how at-ease he is with Josephine, Rudy and the others, makes our joy all the greater.

We thank providence for having put l'Arche on our path as well as all the people who are involved.

Today, we cannot feel but reassured for the future, to see how l'Arche accompanies its residents both in the day to day, through illness, and at any other moments of their lives.

She is gifted, she sings well, and repeats what we say in French even if she doesn't fully understand the language. When

When preparing to welcome Mari's parents, who are Japanese, I taught Kathy a Japanese refrain, "Thank you Lord, thank you." She sang it very well. I congratulated her saying, "Bravo Kathy!" Gaëtan is someone who is very generous. Even though he is in a wheelchair, he insists on going to the dépanneur to buy gum. Not for himself, but simply to share with others!

There is also Michel, a person who radiates joy. When I teach him a new activity and he succeeds at it, he is very proud of himself. On the other hand, when he doesn't succeed, he remains optimistic and says to me, "We're here to learn." And it's true!

The following is a testimony by Marie, who shares with us her choice to become an assistant in one of our homes after having spent time as an assistant while she was a student.

Last spring, a friend of mine spoke to me about her idea of becoming an assistant at l'Arche. Listening to her, I said to myself, "Well, why not me too?" I had one more term at university in speech therapy, with very few classroom hours to do. During the course of my studies, I had courses and stages with the handicapped, but I was interested in discovering daily life with intellectually handicapped people,

living "being" more than "doing". In September, I was welcomed at the home l'Arc-en-Ciel, where I learned a lot. Everyday life is very routine and our tasks are very ordinary, but it is in this context that we learn to live together and to love. I recently heard, "community life is a school in love." At l'Arche, it is to learn to love the Core members and the assistants. Jean Vanier speaks of community as a place of festivities and of forgiveness. Sure enough, I quickly saw that daily life has the rhythm of festivities, occasions to get together which are significant for all the members of the community. Life at l'Arche is also an opportune context to learn to live forgiveness and mercy. Several times I was surprised by the capacity of certain people, Core members or assistants, to ask for forgiveness and to forgive. I have so much to learn from them. It is thanks to forgiveness that the home can live in peace and have the experience of real love. In the same sense, living at l'Arche raises questions in me about vulnerability and strength. What relationship do I have with the Core members? Can I also recognize my weaknesses and accept them? I have decided to prolong my commitment to l'Arche because I am still learning! I will end with a quote that echoes my questions, "Our world which is based on efficiency and strength needs to discover the path of weakness. There is a dynamic element to weakness. God's logic is not our logic. The wisdom of God is not the wisdom of men. The great wisdom of God is; "do not be afraid of weakness, do not be afraid! It is in your weakness, in the heart of your fragility that you will discover the presence of God." "That is the Christian mystery." #### News of Jean Vanier, through excerpts from his December, 2015, letter.

In mid-December, I was in Bethlehem. It was an immense joy to find that since my last visit Jean Vaniler there, three years ago, our community has grown - a joy again to meet Kathy, Mahera, Amira, Haythem, Sara, each one. The community is now located in a large house close to the Basilica of the Nativity. A beautiful community, exploding with joy, even though the situation in the country remains very difficult. It was obvious how happy everyone was to be together, Muslims and Christians, in an atmosphere of mutual support, simplicity of life and productive work. Today Bethlehem is surrounded by a huge wall, eight meters high and over 500 km long. On both sides of this wall live men, women and children who are afraid. Very close to Bethlehem is Jerusalem, a city of hope in spite of war and division. This is the heart of a torn humanity, a city where people weep and live in fear, where there are signs of death but at the same time, signs of hope and resurrection. Out of Bethlehem, where there is so much desolation and fear, there springs

forth a song of thanksgiving. And at the heart of Bethlehem there is our community that sings about peace, unity and joy. It was a great joy for me to be at the heart of the community and also to pray in the grotto of the vast Basilica of the Nativity, the hidden place where Jesus was born. Accompanied by Odile, I spent four days of joy and peace in our community, happy with all that I have seen, touched and heard. L'Arche is small and composed of very fragile and weak people who have often been viewed by their parents as a source of shame and sometimes even as a punishment from God. And yet in L'Arche they become a sign of real relationship. The weakness of different people, born of different cultures and religions, has become the place of relationship. Weakness has found a new meaning through what we desire to live in our communities of L'Arche and Faith and Light. It is no longer a reality to be despised, to be kept at a distance, but a reality that becomes a link. It is the cry: "I need you, your respectful and loving presence." Weakness becomes gift that unites the community, as we come to realise our great need for one another. **Iean Vanier**
